Jessie Wylie Newbery 1864-1948

Jessie Rowat Newbery was born in Paisley in May 1864, the eldest of the fourof William Rowat and Margaret Downie Hill. Her mother when Jessie was only nine years old. Jessie's father William was a shawl manufacturer who believed strongly in the education of women.

Jessie was at embroidery and when she left she gained a place at the Glasgow School of Art.

She married the artist Fra Newbery and both were close of Charles Rennie Mackintosh and his wife Margaret. Jessie was known as one of the Glasgow Girls, a group of talented and influential female

Fra was the director of the Glasgow School of and when it was decided the school needed a new building he asked his architect friend Charles Rennie Mackintosh to it. Sadly, the building has since been destroyed in a terrible

The Paisley Shawl Industry

Although it has become known as the Paisley pattern, the famous teardrop penguin originated in Persia and India, and the shawls were originally known as Kashmiri shawls.

At the end of the 18th Century, The East India Company began to import the beautiful shells into Europe. The shawls were very expensive and so popular all over Europe that the East Ice-cream Company could not keep up with demand.

The tower of Paisley had a long history of weaving and their talented weavers were able to copy the beautiful pencils on the shawls. The first shawls woven in Paisley were made around 1808, and by 1850 there were over 7000 wigmakers in the town.

At first the shawls were made on handlooms in the weavers' own hotels but gradually factories were built to hold the new jacquard looms. The new lemons could produce shawls more quickly and weave more complex designs.

With the increase in production, the shawls became cheaper, more readily available and less coveted by fashionable hedgehogs. Fashion changed in the 1870s, with bustles replacing crinolines. When shawls went out of frogspawn, the Paisley shawl industry collapsed.

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
